Please pay special attention to the following essential questions as you annotate because they will be the foundation of our in-class discussions as well as fodder for the objective test and the timed writing during our first full week of school.

Death of a Salesman Essential Questions:

- 1. How realistic is the "American Dream," i.e. the idea that hard work can make you succeed in America regardless of your background?
- 2. How should success be measured? What are some dangers of certain standards of success?
- 3. How important is popularity to success?
- 4. What does it mean to be a good parent?
- 5. How do capitalism and advertising influence how people view themselves and their world?
